

Helping Indigenous communities in FNQ

In the Indigenous communities around Cairns and the Atherton Tablelands of far north Queensland, access to dental care has been a long term, ongoing problem. The waiting list for basic care is around a year and this has been causing people with minor problems to develop acute or chronic conditions.

The problem is not a lack of facilities - the local Indigenous health service at Wuchopperen has two fully equipped dental rooms at its Cairns clinic and a mobile dental van ready to travel to Atherton and outlying communities. Wuchopperen has a community-based

the 'Filling the Gap' programme in January this year. "I have wanted to do some volunteer work in dentistry for some time and there are programs in Nepal, Vietnam and Cambodia - but it's for a longer period of time and it's hard to take time off from my practice.

"I found it was quite easy to take a week off to do this and I really enjoyed the interaction with the patients and the challenges of trying to motivate them to help prevent dental problems. I'm planning to go back in November."

To date the results are really exciting. Since the programme began in January 2006 there has been:

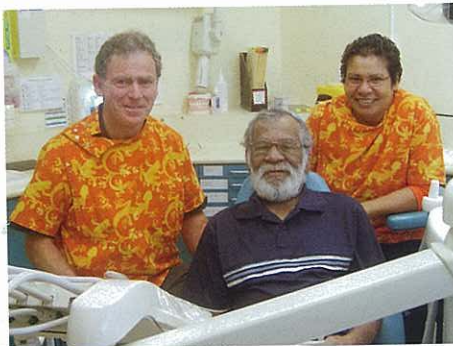
health service that is highly innovative, servicing the area's 20,000 Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islanders with a range of services such as GP clinics, primary health care, counselling, family support, nutrition and health promotion. What the service does lack though, are dentists.

Filling the Gap is a response to this deficiency. It's a simple and effective program involving a partnership between Wuchopperen, a community-managed Indigenous health service and a group of concerned individuals.

Filling the Gap is privately-funded by benefactors with a steering committee made up of dentists, community advocates and the Muru Marri Indigenous Health Unit at the University of NSW.

Dentists volunteer for one or two weeks at a time. Filling the Gap assists with the airfares, Wuchopperen provides accommodation, registration fees for Queensland and the use of a car. The program is flexible, so it is possible to combine the trip with some time-off in the area afterwards.

- A 300%+ increase in dental care provided at Wuchopperen;
- Over 545 patients treated, including 68 new patients;
- 1320+ dental procedures completed;
- 14 dental weeks provided by 11 volunteer dentists; and
- 28 potential volunteer dentists expressing interest for later in 2006/07.

Staff and community at Wuchopperen Health Service are extremely pleased and believe the volunteer dentists will have an impact far beyond their individual one or two week visits. Through provision of better dental care, there will hopefully be flow-on effects for people's general health.
