A REMARKABLE ACHIEVEMENT

On March 7 more than 120 people gathered at the Lane Cove Residents for Reconciliation meeting to listen to an **address by Craig Ashby**. This charming Aboriginal man from Walgett recounted for us the story of his progress through childhood where due to a considerable amount of wagging school he did not learn to read and write.

He was sent to Dubbo by his grandmother (his mother died when he was two). While there in Year 9 he suddenly heard of the program for Aboriginal boys at St Josephs College in Sydney. He applied and was accepted. He blossomed there in the support and companionship the school gave him.

He was allotted a tutor who, one on one, gave him lessons every night and he soon learned the magic of being able to read and write.

He is now in his second year at University studying to become a teacher having received two credits and two distinctions in his first year. His ambition is to return to his community and devote himself to doing all he can for them by way of education.. His address held everyone spellbound.

Craig is a wonderful role model for other Aboriginal boys and it was gratifying that students from St Joseph's, St Ignatius and Kincoppal were present including several Aboriginal boys and girls

BRIDGE WALK

I decided to take advantage of Kerrie's offer to join the Indigenous walkers on the evening of the **Bridge's 75th Birthday Celebrations**. We all met near Milson's Point station, while we waited to commence the walk a couple of young chaps walked around with a bucket of clay and painted our face and/or arms. Banners were unfurled and flags etc. handed out. Folk from a number of different Reconciliation groups joined the throng of people. It was very overcast, as we walked up the road onto the bridge we were handed yellow caps with a tiny light in the centre. We halted at the first pylons: our leader, Uncle Max Eulo in traditional dress who was carrying a small log with smoking leaves, started a chant which was picked up by large speakers either side of the road, and smoke started pouring over us. The chant, supported by clap sticks, and smoke continued all the way across the bridge to the second pylons: folk moved slowly and walked in time to the chant, it was growing dark, coloured lights lit the arch as we moved along. The experience was like a walking meditation as one walked through a soundscape of chant and smoke under the great iron arch in the growing dusk. From the arms joining the southern pylons was hung a line of wind chimes which sang as we passed under them and away from the chanting. Everyone was relaxed and enjoyed themselves, especially the children. Looking back as we walked toward York St. there was a river of tiny lights moving over the bridge and dispersing into the city from the following crowds. It was such a marvellous experience and I'll remember it with pleasure for many years.----- *Cassie Thornley*

The Guringai Festival runs from Sorry Day (26 May), through Reconciliation Week (27 May - 3 June) and through to the end of NAIDOC Week (mid July).
